

ELECTRONIC TIMING

What is the first thing a top swimmer does when he finishes a race? He looks to see his time. With more and more pools getting their own timing boards this is something even the youngest competitive swimmer can do.

The Dundee Olympia Leisure Centre has purchased a 6 lane Omnisport board with illuminated (LED) figures. The board also indicates the event and heat numbers. Now with the reduction in price by the Midland District even Club galas can afford the £25 to have electronic timing for the benefit of swimmers, coaches, and parents. The time is indicated every time they touch the pad.

But the £25 is a discounted price and assumes that the Club provides a trainee to operate the timing and the Club provides the labour to set up (and take down) the equipment, which now includes a Colorado electronic horn start. In this way Clubs are helping to improve the quality of their own events for swimmers, spectators and coaches.

Did you know that the SASA has a Committee to advise it on Electronic Timing? It has set up a stockpile of spares and buys in bulk where possible. At present it is looking for someone who is willing to fashion sturdy boxes for the transport of 6 time display boards to pools who do not have their own boards. The tender loving care bestowed on the old boxes has caused them to disintegrate. If you can help please contact Colin Wilson (0383 727905) who is in charge of the East and Scottish equipment.

With the increasing use of electronic timing we need more operators. If you can set a video recorder or work a word processor then you can easily learn to operate the timing. You don't have to be an electrician but they are very helpful in doing repairs and so cutting operating costs. 

NATIONAL AND REGIONAL FACILITIES REVIEW

The Board of Management are currently conducting a review of National and Regional facilities for submission to the Scottish Sports Council.

With the onset of a National Lottery and the potential funding that this will create for capital building projects, each Sport in Scotland is currently reviewing their needs at National and Regional level. This review will look at the requirements for new and upgraded facilities for National Squad Training and Interational Competition. It will also look at a potential network of Regional facilities for use by Regional and National Squads for training and Regional competition. Club facilities will also be considered in relation to a strategic nationwide approach to the provision of high quality club facilities.



The City of Glasgow Swim Team com -menced their first morning workout during the first week in October at the Whitehill and Castlemilk Pools. The team has now started its first cyclic training phase taking them through a nine week cycle through to the Christmas break. Head Coach Dave Bance met with Parents and Athletes individually of the senior squad to explain the years' upcoming training programme, training camps and the commitments required by parents, athletes and coaches to be successful in competitive swimming. There are sixteen members of the senior squad training on a daily basis with a gradual increase planned in November and double sessions planned for March 1994 going into the Long Course season.

The commencement of training on Saturday mornings at the Castlemilk Centre has given athletes the opportunity to develop their Sports Psychology skills with group work on such areas as Relaxation, Visualization, Goal Setting and Training commitment and Focus.

The teams Open Squad Training days has met with a tremendous response from non-squad members with over sixty young athletes signing up for the programme. The programme which is open to any swimmer of a Glasgow based club commenced in mid October will focus on introducing young swimmers to the world of competitive swimming. Workouts will consist of stroke skills, starts and turns and the development of mental skills

The team welcomed Graham Wardell to Glasgow when he commenced his coaching duties with the Glasgow District Council in October. Wardell has been involved in swimming for over 20 years both as a swimmer and as a coach. His previous coaching positions were with the City of South ampton Swimming Club and Andover Swimming Club. Wardell's appointment now completes the full time staff of the Swimming Development section which now has three full time Coach/Development Officers and two Swimming Co-ordinators.

Coaching Fee's have now been set at £10 per month for the senior squad and £5 for Junior squad members.

The swimming development section of the Parks and Recreation are hosting the 2nd Glasgow International Swimming Masters Meet 1993 on 12/13th November at Whitehill Pool. It will bring together masters swimmers from Scotland. England, Wales, Ireland and hopefully Europe, some of whom are World record holders.


The event starts on Friday evening, then follows two sessions on Saturday. On the Saturday evening the City of Glasgow is to host a Civic Reception for competitors and officials at the City Chambers.

To promote schools swimming within this meet an invitation .schools relay is planned. This is open to local primary schools and takes the form of a 4 X 25m mixed relay. With heats on the Saturday morning, followed by finals in the afternoon. Spectators are encouraged to come along and will then be automatically entered in a special free prize draw for a book of ten tickets to any of the City's pools.

111 SYNCHRONIZED SWIMMING JUNIOR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 7th edition of these championships was contested in the best of spirits. The most skilled young specialists in synchronized swimming from 28 nations competed: 33 entries had originally been received for this event. The presence for the very first time of the South African synchronized swimmers at this level was a pleasure to watch and their rapid progress in this sport shows a lot of hope for the future.

Peter Hassall, the Secretary of the competitions informed us that the performance given by Olga Brusnikina (RUS), 14 years old, was a very

OPEN WATER SWIMMING

On the 31st July, 64 competitors, of which 21 were female, from 13 different nations competed in the open water swimming event between Lausanne and Evian swimming a calculated distance of 12.3 km. In the men's category, Dario Taraboi (ITA) was victorious in 2h33'47; and in the women's category, Edith van Dijk (NED) placed first in 2h42'40. Both established new records for this event.

The prize of the IOC President was attributed based on the total number of points of the first four swimmers from the same team:

IX JUNIOR DIVING WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

In the reputable site of the Crystal Palace National Sports Centre in London, divers from 31 nations contested for the twelve junior world championship titles. Although the number of competitors was guite large, under the direction of Jeff Cook and the members of the Organizing Committee, the organization of the event was carried out excellently. The members of the Russian team earned four gold medals, ahead of Germany who took three golds and the Ukraine (2). Australia, Canada and Romania each achieved one title.

The participating Federations in water polo may nominate one referee (two, if the Federation has men's and women's teams participating). Non-participating Federations in the water polo tournament may nominate only one water polo referee from which 6 (six) neutral referees will be selected.



It is with great pleasure that the Scottish Sports Council and the Royal Mail would like to announce the re-launch of the Royal Mail Sports Awards Scheme.

What are the Awards?

The awards are an initiative between the Scottish Sports Council and the Royal Mail. They are aimed at providing financial assistance for items of equipment and/ or upgrading facilities to promote sport for young people, women and people with disabilities.

What sports are eligible for the Awards?

All sports of governing bodies recognised by the Scottish Sports Council are eligible for grant assistance.

How much can be applied for?

The maximum total project cost considered is £20,000. The contribution made by the Scottish Sports Council and Royal Mail will be up to 50% of the project cost subject to a maximum grant of £2.000 (£1.000 from Scottish Sports Council and £1,000 from Royal Mail.
