

NEWS FROM

Congratulations to Andrew Aitken on his selection to the Scottish Commonwealth Games Team. Andrew is ample proof that hard work really does pay off when he swum to two best times at the Commonwealth Trials in the 100m/200m Backstroke. Andrew who renewed his partnership with Head Coach Dave Bance trained in Glasgow upon returning from University in the States. At present he is travelling to the RCP for long course training three times per week with Bance before his departure with the Games Team.

BRITISH CAP

Neil Aitken (no relation) has been making waves in swimming with multiple titles and British records in the Junior and Senior British Disabled Championships and this has been followed up with a Great Britain selection for the "Uprising Cup" in the Czech Republic.

NATIONAL TITLES

Glasgow had a successful year at the Scottish National events with 2 Senior and 7 Junior titles at the Long Course followed by 11 Age Group titles in Ayr this gave a team total of 20 National titles. It has been a good start in the reemergence of the Glasgow Team.

WALES

A small team travelled to the Welsh ASA Championships mainly for experience, but one member Neil Carrick was rewarded with a 6th place in the Juvenile Breaststroke event.

SPEEDO SPONSORSHIP

Speedo will be helping Glasgow next year by sponsoring a monthly awards for Intermediate and Development Squads. As the 1993/94 season is coming to a close, plans are now in place for next season, the first step being registration at Castlemilk Pool during the morning of 6th August.

OLYMPIC PATHWAY

The second Olympic Pathway, one day training camps, were held at four sites within the City, Castlemilk, Pollokshaws, Drumchapel and Easterhouse. These development days involve gymnastics, volleyball, basketball and aquatic skills, provide the link between the Learn to Swim Programme and competitive swimming and they are also used as part of the talent identification programme. The camps are scheduled every eight weeks, during this camp seventy swimmers attended throughout the City, many were identified as future potential squad members and offered places within the City's coaching structure.

BIOMECHANICS CONFERENCE

The Welsh Amateur Swimming Association in conjunction with the Sports Council for Wales are presenting a major Biomechanics Conference at the Welsh Institute of Sport, Sophia Gardens, Cardiff, on Saturday and Sunday 15th and 16th October 1994.

The principal speaker is -

Rein Haljand - Professor of Biomechanics, Dean of Faculty, Tallin University. He worked for 20 years on the Soviet National Swimming Team where his specialist contribution was in Biomechanics. Professor Haljand has lectured world wide on his subject and has made a significant contribution to the success enjoyed by FINLAND, a

country that has placed great emphasis on technical preparation.

He is well known within L.E.N. where he is a member of the Swimming Technical Committee and has also officiated at many major championships.

During the two days of the conference Professor Haljand's themes will be:-

Technical Preparation of Swimmers, Analysis of Starts & Turns, Analysis of Strokes, Testing in Competition, Testing in Training.

The other speakers are as follows:- **Rene Nevola** - M.MED.SCI. Project Leader in Biomechanics at the Centre for Human Sciences, Defence Research Agency, Farnborough

Rene was educated at Campion School, Essex and Loughborough University of Technology where he gained a BSc (Hons) in Human Biological Sciences. His Master of Medical Sciences was achieved at the Royal Hallamshire Hospital, University of Sheffield.

Carl Payton, BA (Hons) Human Movement Studies, PGCE - South Glamorgan Institute, MSc Physical Education and Sports Science, Loughborough University of Technology. Currently Head of Biomechanics in the Department of Sport and Environmental Studies at the Crewe and Alsager Faculty of the Manchester Metropolitan University. Member of B.A.S.E.S. and Secretary of the Biomechanics Section. These two speakers will outline their methodology for three dimensional analysis with particular reference to elite swimmers.

Kim Swanwick, B Ed (Hons) Bedford 1988, M M.Med Sci - University of Sheffield. Former Head Coach of Warrender Baths Club and a member of the Scottish Coaching Panel. Kim was a GB Coach at the European Championships 1993 and is Coach to World Short Course and World Student Games medallist Fraser Walker. Kim's main theme will be an overview of the practical application of sports science in the coaching of swimming.

MASTERS

FIVE TIMES WORLD CHAMPION FOUR MASTERS WORLD RECORDS!

That was the Stop Press News from FINA World Masters Championships in Montreal - Flora Connolly had won all five of her events and set four World Masters records in the process a truly outstanding performance. The full results will be available for the next issue of Swimming 2000. Flora is Scotland's most successful Masters swimmer and has been in top form from the start of the season. 60 year old Flora started her season with the Welsh National Masters Championships where she broke four World Masters records, 100m Breaststroke 1.32.12, 200m Breaststroke 3.19.67, 200m Butterfly 3.17.0, and the 200m I/M 3.12.74.

At the Scottish Championships in May, she broke two more records, her own 200m I/M record 3.11.84 and the 100m Butterfly 1.29.99.

Over the long course at the Great Britain Masters Championships in Leeds it was another two World Masters records, 200m Breaststroke 3.24.83 200m Butterfly 3.26.76. She just missed the 400m I/M record by two fifths of a second.

Flora's eight World best times was a record in itself and a boost for the hopes of the Scottish contingent which travelled to Montreal:-

> Betty McMillan, Janet Stobie, Pauline Harrington, Eddie Riach, Alec Galletly and Matt Nelson.

FINA RULES

The FINA Masters Technical Congress was held in Montreal prior to the Championships watch SWIMMING 2000 for details in a future issue.

Next Scottish Masters event, Saturday 20th August Vale of Leven Masters, Alexandria, followed by the Silver City Masters in Aberdeen on Saturday 27th August.

SCOTTISH MASTERS LONG COURSE CHAMPIONSHIPS

At the first Scottish Masters Long Course event held for some years there were several fine performances.

In the 40 - 44 age group Eddie Riach reduced his own 200m Individual Medley European and British Masters records by more than one and a half seconds with an excellent 2.24.02.

It was good to see former Olympian Bob McGregor back in action and a great "debut" it was too - he set a new Great Britain 50 - 54 age group record in the 50m Butterfly with a 30.45 swim. He also won the 50m Freestyle in 27.72.

Swimming the first leg of the relay Brian Archibald swam a 25.91 for a new GB record in the 35 - 39 section.

Other new British records were set by Joseph Philips 60 - 64 50m Freestyle 30.82 and in the 65 - 69 group Ken McKay reduced clubmate Forbes Gentleman's time in the 200m Individual Medley by 1 second.

Flora Connolly 60 - 64 and Janet Stobie 65 - 69 both had a clean sweep winning all five of their events.

The prizewinning teams - teams nearest world Masters records - were won by Motherwell Masters 240 + years Men, Glasgow Nomads 120 + years Men. The womens prizewinners were Motherwell Masters 120 + years and Milngavie and Bearsden 160 + years.

TRAINER/ASSESSORS UPDATE SPINAL CORD INJURY MANAGEMENT

LONG DISTANCE SWIMMING

The Long Distance Section is now in the capable hands of Mr Ian McIntosh, and already the programme is well underway.

Great Britain Trials

Mr McIntosh, who attended as the Scottish representative on the Great Britain Technical Long Distance Committee, has made the following report on the trials and selection meeting held at Weymouth on the 26th June.

The meeting was held on completion of the ASA 25k Championships which doubled as the GB Team Trials. The objective, to select the swimmers to represent GB in the World Championships at Terracino, Italy on 8th September 1994.

It was hoped to take the first and second in both the mens and womens events if the performances were good enough. The criteria, to complete the course with the two hour cut-off point in accordance with FINA Rules. Regretfully only one swimmer, Miss Sara Ward, the outright winner at Weymouth in 5 hours 58 minutes, was accepted by the Committee. Sara will represent Great Britain accompanied by Miss Sarah Hunt as the staff official.

The only other swimmers in the frame, Simon Lee and Rachel Godburn, were considered too slow on the Weymouth performance to justify inclusion.

The Championship Itself.

I was very disappointed with various aspects of the organisation, in particular the standard of support vessels and the quality of crews provided. I would not have got off with it at club level. I have a copy of Miss Linlay Agley's comments and although I cannot comment on her remarks concerning the briefing on Saturday 25th June, I endorse fully her comments in section four of her letter. The swimmers negotiated the first half to threequarters of a mile without boats, which included circumventing a certain landmark. At the start of a 25k event, with so much riding on the result, confidence and motivation are vital and this lack of support does nothing for morale. Apart from

Miss Agley, several "top" swimmers retired early into the swim and I know a few of them were far from pleased.

It had been hoped to confirm a bid for a future World Championship to be held at Weymouth. The location is superb and it offers alternate routes in the event of rough weather. The water temperature is usually 66° in September which meets FINA requirements but the organisational standards and quality of back up are so far short of the mark. The bid has been deferred until the matter can be fully appraised.

It was the first open water event to be held at Weymouth and obviously improvements can be made.



EVENTS

Senior and Junior Championships are being held at Loch Lubnaig on Saturday 30th July. There are three boys and three girls in the Junior event with two men and three women in the Senior Championship. Presentations will be held in the Munro Hotel, Strathyre, in the afternoon.

The 10 mile Senior Championship at Loch Rannoch on Saturday 13th August was missed from the BLDSA Handbook and the English swimmers who usually take part have made other arrangements and consequently a low entry is expected.

SPORT FOR THE 21ST CENTURY

The Government have announced at long last their proposals for support for sport which involves a major reshaping of the present administration.

A new United Kingdom Sports Council and English Sports Council will replace the Great Britain Sports Council in the next financial year ie. from April 1995.

The new UKSC will concentrate on helping to bring major international sporting events to Britain and to increase greatly the influence of the UK in international sport.

For the first time professional sport will be fully and specifically represented

As an early task, the UKSC will look at what sporting policies should have a UK- wide application and where there is unnecessary overlap and duplication.

The new English Sports Council will cut back on sports bureaucracy and marginal activities. Instead, it will concentrate its resources on helping grassroots sport and the governing bodies of sport. England will thus be in the same position as Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.

The UKSC will consist of 10 members; an independent Chairman, the Chairmen of the four Home Country Sports Councils, one representative each of the British Olympic Association, of amateur non-Olympic sport, and of professional sport and two independent members with strong sporting credentials, one from a professional and one from an amateur background.

The UKSC will not have a supervisory remit but it will oversee those areas where there is a need for a UK-wide policy; for example, on doping control, sports science, sports medicine and coaching. However, the Home Country Sports Councils would be responsible for the delivery of these policies.

The Home Country Sports Councils will be responsible for the distribution of the National Lottery but the UK body will offer expert advice on applications of UK importance.

The Council's National Development Services section is involved in implementing programmes to raise standards of achievement in Welsh sport. This involves dealing primarily with governing bodies of sport, statutory bodies and other agencies.

The section manager will be responsible for six officers implementing initiatives with a total budget of around £1.5m. In particular, the post-holder will manage the operation of specific grant-aid schemes to raise standards of performance and excellence.

Ideally educated to degree-level or equivalent, candidates should have a wide knowledge of sport and recreation, and have several years' relevant experience. They should also possess the necessary leadership and management qualities to run a high-profile section of the Council.

Starting salary will depend on qualifications and experience, and will include a 20 per cent addition for the normally long and unsocial hours. Benefits include a contributory pension (to which the Council contributes 4% of salary) and performance-related pay.
