

PREMIER PENALTIES

The outcome of serious misbehaviour at the Premier League fixture last October at Drumchapel Baths was the suspension of Andrew Gilhooly (Portobello) for four months from 1st January, Giles Gilhooly (Portobello) received a written warning regarding his future behaviour. The Portobello Club also received a written warning advising that action would be taken against the club if there was any repetition of the misbehaviour by their players and officials.

The Portobello Club appealed against the suspension of Andrew Gilhooly, the Appeals Committee considered their grounds for the appeal and examined all the papers connected with the case. They decided that there were insufficient grounds for an appeal and recommended that the £50 fee should be retained by the Association.

On the other hand a complaint and appeal, arising from the same occasion, from Mr George Spowart (Dunfermline) was upheld by the Appeals Committee. The Committee agreed with the points raised by Mr Spowart but ruled that the Scottish Water Polo Committee Disciplinary Hearing had dealt with the matters of concern. The Appeals Committee recommended that a priority should be given to the training and support of Water Polo Referees.

A separate incident at a match between Renfrew Aqua and Hamilton Baths resulted in a two year ban on spectator Bobby Barr, this was reduced to six months after consideration was given to his previously exemplary behaviour over a period 45 years.



EUROPEAN JUNIOR WATER POLO CHAMPIONSHIPS 31 JULY - 7 AUGUST 1994 - BRATISLAVA


Ross Elder has been appointed to referee at the Junior Championships which are being hosted by the Slovak Republic.

There was consternation at Cardiff when the Great Britain Team Manager announced the GB Senior Squad selection which included only four Scots and eleven English players. However the GBTechnical Committee has yet to approve the selection. The Scottish officials also were of the opinion that the Junior Squad selection did not include Scottish players who had shown their ability during the contest.

Mark Taylor will coach the GB Senior and Junior Teams.

REFEREES

Joe Duffy, West District Water Polo Convener, is keen to set up a training and support programme for Water Polo Referees. He feels that Referees should have the opportunity to improve their skills and experience in line with the opportuities available to players. A seminar is planned for all referees and officials in the near future. Information will be circulated by Ross Elder as soon as a date and a venue are confirmed.





The City of Glasgow Swim Team have been involved in three major meets over the past months, with swimmers travelling within the West of Scotland and to England and Wales. Derwentside was the Team's first visit outside Scotland this year and brought with it a host of personal bests from the 16 swimmers involved. A smaller team travelled to the Welsh Dragon Meet in Cardiff, a major meet in Wales. Again it gave the Glasgow swimmers an opportunity to compete in a top class event. The next venue was Johnstone for the Renfrew District Open Meet with the team spirit very high swimmers made several finals.

DUAL MEETS

Glasgow has hosted two very successful Dual Meets this year at Castlemilk Pool on Saturday mornings. These meets are designed to create a competitive programme that will encourage swimmers to achieve PB's. One point is awarded for every 0.1 second improvement on P.B. and these are added to the team's overall points. The heavy fall of snow did cause some problems at the second meet and it was rumoured that the snowploughs made a special effort to clear the road, enabling East Kilbride to compete in this successful meet.

OLYMPIC PATHWAY

As part of the drive to encouraging sport Glasgow is promoting the "Olympic Pathway Programme". This is a multi-sport programme for eight to twelve year olds who have shown potential in swimming; other sports such as gymnastics, netball, volleyball and basketball will be on offer during a one day camp.

CONGRATULATIONS

Congratulations must go out to Neil Aitken who recently joined Pollokshaw and Whiteinch Swimming Clubs and trains with the COG Development Scheme at Drumchapel. Neil competed in the British Junior Swimming Championships for Disabled, at Darlington recently and won eight gold medals and set eight British records.

MINI MEETS

The Mini Meets series between the Glasgow Clubs drew to a close in March, over 80 swimmers were identified as future champions proving how important this type of competition is in the development of successful swimmers.

TOP SWIMMERS

Two top names in World swimming visited Glasgow in February they were Adrian Moorehouse and David Wilkie. Adrian hosted the swimming clinic at Castlemilk Pool, which was a great success, involving 75 swimmers and David promoted the Childrens' Hospice Appeal sponsored swims at Whitehill and Drumchapel pools.

WELCOME

Glasgow would like to offer a warm welcome to Craig Miller, Stuart Hogg, Ruth Leaver and Susan Simpson who have joined the Swimming Development Scheme from Scotia and will be representing Glasgow in future events. Craig is currently a member of the Scottish Youth Squad and Stuart and Ruth have both been placed in the finals of the Scottish National Age Group Championships.

TRAINING WEEKENDS

The U-14 year swimmers have attended two weekend training camps at Girvan, one in late January then again in March. Swimmers attended sessions at the pool, land training and lectures during the weekend which were designed to help them prepare for the West Districts.

SYNCHRO UPOATE

The Scottish synchro trio, Sarah Burgon, Morag Duncan and Jane Liston, are continuing their quest to compete in the Commonwealth Games in August. The girls are all members of the Scottish Elite Synchronised Swimming Squad and Edinburgh Synchronised Swimming Club.

In December 1993 Sarah and Jane had the opportunity of travelling to Saskatchewan to be coached by the top 2 provincial coaches, Laurie Wachs and Sherry Vannin. The pair had worked with Laurie Wachs on 2 previous occasions, and she was very impressed with the improvement since she was last in Edinburgh in September, 1992. The aim of this trip was to prepare new routines. As a result of spending 5 hours in the water and long periods of land-drill a day, the 2 synchro swimmers returned home with new solo and duet routines. These will be used over the coming competitive season and in the Commonwealth Games if the girls are successful in being selected. They also attended a 2 day figure camp with coaching from Julie Sauve. national coach who took Canada's Sylvie Frechette to Olympic Gold.

Sarah and Jane returned to Canada at the end of February. They trained for 3 weeks, with Edmonton's former chief coach, who has recently moved to Calgary to benefit from her expertise in figure coaching. Unfortunately, Morag was unable to take up this opportunity due to other commitments

All three girls will be hoping to achieve a personal best at the

International German Open Competition in Bonn at the end of March where they will be competing against top class countries. Likewise when they participate in the Swedish Open at the end of May.

NEWS FLASH

Mrs Mary Black has been appointed as Chief Referee for the Synchronised Swimming Competitions at the 1994 Commonwealth Games in Victoria, Canada. Mary is delighted to receive this honour from the Games Organising Committee.

NEWS FLASH

Mrs Elizabeth Bowman has taken over the vacant National Synchronised Swimming Convener's post. The post has been vacant for a year since the previous Convener Mrs Helen Murray was elected President of the East District and was therefore not eligible to serve as Convener.

Talking to competitors at Alloa it appears that Scotland will have its best representation ever at the FINA World Masters Championships in July at Montreal.

A BLAST FROM THE PAST

Is the fun going out of swimming?

Are swimmers really as bored as they look on the poolside? What is happening to sporting etiquette - applauding swimmers, pride in club achievement, being ready for presentations etc.? Are we becoming so individual in approach that we are not interested in the efforts of others?

Where are we going wrong? Do too many team managers think their only job is to stand in front of swimmers with a stopwatch to the neglect of fostering team spirit and ensuring swimmers are on time for starts and medal ceremonies - and tidily attired for their presentations?

These were some issues addressed by Alex. Spence (President of SASA in 1967) speaking at the Past Presidents' Association Dinner in Edinburgh after the A.G.M.

Alex. is well qualified to comment after 49 years as an official. At 27 years of age he took over as Swimming Training and Selection Convener organising the first National Easter Courses for seven years, acting as Scottish and GB team manager, & organising the first international trip for Scottish Teams outwith Great Britain, He has experience of several Commonwealth Games. & organised the SASA Championships for six vears, the Scottish Schools Championships for six years, as well as a number of international events. Following his three year stint as President of the Scottish Schools Swimming Association, he acted as Secretary of the Four Countries Internation Committee (W.I.S.E.), the only Scot to hold that post. He was a founder member of Scottish Swimming Awards. serving on the Board of Management for 20 years. This well qualifies him to compare attitudes over the years. He feels there is no single answer to the present malaise. Apart from sloppy work by some club team officials. trendy educationalists' pronouncements against "elitism" prevalent in many schools
