

WORLD RECORD START FOR GLASGOW'S NEW



China's Han Xue took just 30.88 secs to stamp the label of approval on Glasgow's magnificent new Tollcross Leisure Centre. On the second day of the World Cup Meet, the teenager sped to a new world record in the 50m breaststroke. It was a superb swim - and just what was needed to bring the venue to world-wide attention. The Centre's introduction to top-class international competition couldn't have been better. The organisation, the facility and a string of records prompted a wonderful response from all quarters.

There is little doubt that the Scottish Amateur Swimming Association, and the team so ably led by Douglas Brown, will be back in harness to stage a World Cup repeat in two years' time.

And there could be more. The SASA is aiming to build on the success, and bring many major events to the Olympicsize pool in the not too distant future.

"We received very favourable comments from FINA, and it was a great start for Glasgow," commented a delighted lan Mason, Chairman of the SASA Board of Management.

The Centre is already scheduled to host two major events this summer. The Scottish Championships take place from June 13-15, while the European Junior Championships are to be held in Scotland for first time from July 31-August 3. Make sure you're there!

Mason continued: "In conjunction with the City of Glasgow, we will be bidding to stage many more meets. Tollcross is a key part of the SASA's international event strategy.

"There is always a long-term lead into securing big events. But, in addition to the World Cup, we hope to have something in place for 1999.

"In terms of organisation and presentation the World Cup reached a new high for Scotland. It is now the standard that will be aiming to repeat at all our own events."

The only missing ingredient was a Scottish medallist - 1999 perhaps?

The Board of Management has a new face with the appointment of Bob Dyett as Vice Chairman Marketing and Public Relations

Bob brings a wealth of experience from big business, having been European marketing communications manager for Honeywell in Brussels and public relations manager at the company's Scottish plant before forming Communications Unlimited in 1988 to offer a wide range of marketing services to high tech. companies in the west of Scotland.

For two years Bob was Chairman of Rutherglen ASC and more recently was appointed as general manager of the amalgamated City of Glasgow Swim Team. He was involved on the coaching staff at Rutherglen and took the A.S.A Teachers certificate last year.

Bob said; "I suppose I got involved in swimming in the same manner as a lot of other people. One minute I was sitting in the gallery watching my daughter in Tank 2 at Rutherglen and the rest is history - and nobody tells you about the early morning training sessions at that stage!"

On the subject of what he foresees in his new role, Bob explained: "In order to attract major sponsorship for the association we need to significantly increase the profile of swimming in Scotland. I have started a review of the way we communicate both internally and to the outside world and hopefully one of the things you should begin to notice is an increase in our exposure in the press."

Bob plans to increase the public awareness of Scottish swimming by a three tier press strategy with coordinated press activity at national level, at district level and at club level. Bob added; "I can't do all this myself, so I will be looking for volunteers, particularly at district level, to form the core of a communications committee." This is just another example of the strategy of professionalism in all the activities of the association to take Scottish swimming into the next millennium.



AT THE DEEP END

Mother knows best when it comes to the physical well-being of Greenock five-year-old Calum Aitken.

Not only did mum Margaret ensure her son was swimming by the age of three, he's now swimming competitively for the local amateur club!

Margaret certainly leads by example - she also swims for Inverclyde Amateur Swimming Club as well as the Invercive Masters.

The Broomhill Court mother won a bronze medal in the 100, metres butterfly in the Scottish Shortcourse Masters held at Hector McNeil Baths, Greenock.

Margaret said: "It is good exercise for him, rather than sitting in front of the television all day and stuffing his face with sweets."

The Overton School primary one pupil appears to be almost unique compared to some of his pals.

"I don't think any of his friends do half as much exercise as him," Margaret said.

"He is in the Anchor Boys at the Boys' Brigade and enjoys going there as well so he is always up to something. He does not see it all as a chore, which helps."

Margaret has been swimming for 16 years, most of them competitively.

"I lived in Rhodesia for four-and-a-half years and did a lot of swimming there, so I decided to join a club when I came back to Greenock,î she said. Ilt is just something that I now enjoy doing which also helps to keep me fit."

"Young Calum has been swimming for two-and-a half-years now and loves every minute of it," says Margaret. "He swims for the club at junior level and has already taken part in the club championships and really enjoyed it." she said.

"He thinks swimming is great and the biggest problem I have with him is trying to get him out of the pool."

"Calum," she said, "wants to go swimming every day but normally ends up going about three or four times a week"

"I feel it is good for his and his breathing because he was diagnosed as having asthma at two," Margaret said. Inverclyde Council sports and recreation officer Don Jamieson agreed that too many children are now gripped by computer games, TV's and videos rather than physical activity.

He suggested that if more parents took exercise like Margaret Aitken, their children would be likely to follow suit

A NOTE FROM GLASGOW!

The last few months have been a very frectic time for the City of Glasgow Swim Team. Here are a few of the highlights:

COMPETITION

Larkhall Open Meet 4/5 October 1996

This is a high quality meet that attracts teams from all over Scotland, with all the major clubs attending. The team put up a very good performance with 26 final placings, 33 personal best times, and 1 new meet record. Louise Coull was Glasgow's lead swimmer with three first places and a new meet record. She was closely followed by Steven Kidd with two firsts and two thirds.

Louise's time in the 100m Backstroke was a new meet record, equalling the time set by Karen Mhairi Lewis of Cumbernauld in 1992. Steven's 200m Backstroke swim was adjudged to be the performance of the meet by a male athlete, and he received a special award for this.

West District Open Championships, Cumbernauld 19/20 October

These championships saw entries from teams from England as well as from all areas of Scotland as it was one of the meets designated for achieving qualifying times for the World short course championships. Medals were awarded to the top three swimmers in each event, as well as to the top placed swimmer from the West District, and the top placed junior swimmer [16 years & under] from the West District.

This competition is split into three sections: Junior (10 & under and 11/12 years), Senior (13/14 and 15 & over years) and a relay competition. The junior section of the club got the team off to a flying start with a superb win. Star performers were Katy Finnegan and Louise Coull who won their respective events in new meet records, along with Jimmy Orr who won the ten and under 50m Backstroke despite having just turned nine.

This was backed up with a solid showing in the relay section to place second, and in a close fought final in the evening the seniors were unlucky not to figure in the top three

However, the combined strength of the team was sufficient to scoop the overall award for the best club in the West of Scotland, a feat previously achieved by the City Team some twenty years earlier!

Kingston Sprint Meet, 24 November

This is a 25m and 50m graded event for swimmers from 8 years upwards and always attracts a big entry from the local clubs. This was the first competitive opportunity for many of the younger members of the team and they really excelled.

It is impossible to mention all the excellent performences and medal winners, but a special mention should be given to Suzanne Robertson, Lucy Wild, Maxine Kerr and Luke Richardson for their outstanding efforts in the 8 years category.

Darlington Open Meet 30 November - 1 December

This is a very good meet for developing junior swimmers, particularly over 200m and 400m events. Many of the current Glasgow 12 and 13 years swimmers have used this meet in the past as a vital part of their preparation for the West District championships.

The swimmers who attended were in superb form Between them they recorded a total of ninety five personal best swims, seven golds, twelve silvers and eleven bronze medals. In addition to this five swimmers - Megan Sharp, Chris Andrews, Stephen O'Shea. Kevin Nixon and Sean Boyle - swam too fast and were awarded special prizes in recognition of their quality swims.

Gold, Silver and Bronze medals were won by members of the team, which included not only swimmers who have been competing from age group level, but also those swimmers who have only recently taken up the sport.

Everyone had a successful weekend and even those who were not fortunate enough to win medals, still went home satisfied with personal best times. The Aer Lingus Swimming Club held two social events, a welcome get tegether on the Friday night and a dinner dance on the Saturday night. By all accounts, the swimmers acquitted themselves with honours in the Guinness stakes!! [Yas, we've seen the photos!].

Both the competition and the social events contributed to a very enjoyable weekend and all the swimmers are already looking forward to the 1997 Irish Masters which will be held in Cork.

The Masters next event was the **Glasgow International Masters** which was held at the Scotstoun Leisure Centre on 8th/9th November. The event is the largest of its kind in Scotland and this year there was a record entry of over 300 competitors from all over

In total there were 4 world records, 3 European records, 1 British and some thirty Scottish records established. Leading record breaker was Conny Boer-Buys from UZC Vlaardingen in Holland with three world records and one European, followed by Martyn Price of Andover with one world, and one European record.

The masters swimmers were catered for in lavish style with a meal and a ceilidh at the Kelvingrove Art Gallery on the Saturday night courtesy of Glasgow City Council. Once again this was a excellent finish to what is probably one of the premier masters events in Great Britain.

THE OPENING OF TOLLCROSS PARK LEISURE CENTRE

The official opening of Tollcross Park Leisure Centre was on Wednesday 4 December. The Centre was opened by Bailie James Mutter, and numerous VIPs attended. The children of the Swim Team gave a display of training in both a short course and long course environment, and all agreed that it is a great place to train!

The leisure comlex is situated in the heart of the East End and plays host to Glasgow's first 50m pool including, we are told, the world's largest moveable pool floor 25m X 25m. Other hi-tec leisure facilities on offer include a state-of-the-art gym, a health suite including saunas, steam room and a spa bath and a fitness studio. There is also an eight court sports hall, a children's softplay room and the usual function rooms and cafeteria.

The two senior squads will be based at Tollcross permanently, with training available five nights and six

mornings a week. This is undoubtedly going to be the biggest asset in the future of the Swim Team.

The removal of the Senior squads to Tollcross has allowed the expansion of the Junior programme in the Satellite centres. The Scotstoun Centre will now have junior groups training every day of the week including Saturday and Sunday, as well as providing a base for the masters swimmers. The Pollokshaws Centre has expanded the pool time available to three times a week, to allow the expansion of the Bronze and Skill squad programme. Castlemilk Pool will be the home of the Gold and Silver squads who will train there every night of the week.

SYNCHRONIZED SWIMMING STARTS IN GLASGOW

Following on from the very successful pre-season synchronized swimming course, the Swim Team has developed a synchronized swimming section. The inaugural meeting of the synchro section took place on Sunday 17 November from 16.00 until 18.00 at Drumchapel.

This training has expanded with the opening of Tollcross Park Leisure Centre to include a second session on a Tuesday from 19.00 until 21.00. These two sessions will be in addition to the inormali training sessions attended by Swim Team members which are used to develop speed and stamina for synchro.

NEW YEAR CAMP(S) 1997

A small group of ten swimmers will be travelling to Club La Santa in Lanzarote on Boxing Day for 12 days of warm weather training. This will provide them with a good aerobic base in the first training cycle of the new year.

The rest of the Swim Team athletes will be participating in the new year camp in Tollcross. This promises to be a very special camp, with the opportunity for the Glasgow swimmers to try Synchro and Water Polo in addition to competitive swimming.

All three disciplines will run for a four day period, and they are programmed so that the swimmers can compile their own programme to cater for their individual preferences. Also incorporated in the camp will be some of Glasgowis top disabled swimmers who will be able to experience the benefits that their able bodied counterparts have had on offer for the last three years.

There is no doubt that this could not have been achieved without the foresight and commitment to swimming displayed by Glasgow City Council and the Swim Team are very grateful for their continued support.

SWIMMING 2000

Scottish Youth Internationalist, Lynn McLaren, had a superb trip down to the highly renowned Stockport International Open Meet two weeks prior to the Scottish Winter Championships in Aberdeen. Lynn swam out of her socks to win gold in the 50m f/c in a new East District record of 26.81 to set a new championship record. Lynn went on to win gold in the 100m breaststroke 1.13.40 another new championship record and East District record. The 200m f/c saw Lynn achieve a superb negative split to win gold in 2.07.67 also collecting two silvers in the 100m f/c 59.09 and 100m backstroke 1.07.23 all East District records.

The Scottish Nationals saw Lynn win the National Title in the 400m f/c 4.29.06; silver in the 200m I.M. 2.24.91; silver 100m breaststroke 1.13.88; bronze in the 50m f/c 27.32 and bronze in the 100m f/c 58.39 altogether a superb month of swimming.

British Youth Internationalist Bryan Morgan, despite a bug, won one National Title the 100m backstroke 59.26 and silver in the 50m backstroke 28.01 whilst war horse veteran Euan Stevens made two consolation finals.

Good swims were achieved by Scottish Youth Squad swimmers Kirsten Sinclair 100m f/c 1.01.45; Lynda Kinnell 200m breaststroke 2.48.89 and also East District squad swimmers Andrew Stewart 200m I.M. 2.20.69, Sarah Kinnell 200m f/c 2.19.01, 400m f/c 4.46.71 and young 14 year old Michael Kane qualifying for the East District squad 100m backstroke 1.06.33. 200m backstroke 22342

The week after the Scottish Nationals saw Bryan Morgan compete in the first ever British Open Championships at Sheffieldis Ponds Forge where he shook off the bug to return to some of his form. Bryan made the Consolation Final of the 50m backstroke in eighth place putting on a superb display in the final to finish in 2nd place in a new Scottish Junior Record of 27.02, two tenths inside his British record. This time won Bryan the gold medal for the top British Junior.

The 50m freestyle heats once gain saw this excellent Scottish prospect take the gold for top British Junior in 23.93. The 50m butterfly heats once gain saw Bryan break another Scottish Junior Record in a time of 26.59 to win British Junior silver. The 100m freestyle heats saw Bryan miss his first turn to finish in 53.01 to win bronze. An excellent end to 1996.

IRELAND TRIP

There was a West District swimming committee meeting during the day to finalise the trip to Ireland and to complete arrangements for the rest of the programme. There was a poor response to the Irish trip - only 9 swimmers wanting to go. The main reasons for not going were cost and the fact that the meet was short course. The cost was around £210 per head. The cost included travel to Prestwick, flights to and from Dublin, bus to and from Galway, 4 nights dinner bed and breakfast and entries for 6 events each. There was also the cost of two coaches and two team staff. The West District contribution would have been £2000. The committee discussed alternative meets and decided that there was not a suitable long course meet before June with an age group and older swimmer element. The committee discounted going to two separate meets. The decision was to expand the two long coursed based weekends in April and May into full residential long

course education events, incorporating the Long Course Time trials at Edinburgh on the two Sunday evenings.

He also reached the final of the 100m Breaststroke where he finished fifth.

Graeme Dodd (11) set his first Meet record winning Gold in the 100m Butterfly for 12 year old boys. Graeme won Bronze in 200m Freestyle, 4th in 200m Individual Medley, 5th in 100m Backstroke and also made the consolation final in two other events.

Sarah Henderson (12) won Silver in the 100m and 200m Freestyle, Bronze in the 100m Backstroke and Breaststroke, 4th in 100m Butterfly and 5th in 200m Individual Medley. This earned her second place in the overall age group for 13 year old girls.

James Carter won Silver in the 100m Backstroke, Bronze in the 200m Freestyle, 4th in the 200m Individual Medley and 5th in the 100m Freestyle.

Steven Tigg was 6th in the 200m Individual Medley and 100m Breaststroke and made consolation finals in three other events. David Russell came 5th in the 100m Butterfly. Lisa Howie came 4th in 100m Freestyle. Richard Eaton and Rona Adam, taking part in the meet for the first time, made consolation finals. The other Stirling swimmers were Sharon Allison, Antony Carter, Euan Docherty, Mark Gilles and Lillian Stewart.



SASA INSURANCE SCHEME

FURTHER NOTES TO CLUBS AND MEMBERS

Following queries from individuals and clubs I met with our insurance brokers and summarise below, in a question and answer format, points which I hope will give a better understanding of the insurance cover in place.

Who is covered?

Associations, all districts, regions, affiliated clubs, and all Per Capita paid members whilst participating in the activity of swimming be it competitive, training or normal swimming, business and social. The interest of voluntary helpers is also covered but only where casually involved.

Are Technical Officials, who are not members of the Association covered for officiating at club, district and national swim meets?

No-all officials must be declared Per Capita members to benefit from insurance cover.

What is the definition of casual helper?

Someone who provides assistance on an irregular basis.

Are club committee members covered?

Only if they are Per Capita declared members of clubs.

Are club volunteers covered?

Voluntary helpers are covered, but only when casually involved. If a voluntary helper is used on a regular basis they must be declared as members to benefit from insurance cover.

Are volunteers escorting children to swim meets covered (i.e. chaperones)?

Yes, If the definition of casual helpers applies. If a volunteer is used regularly then they must be declared members to benefit from insurance cover.

If an accident occurs at a club meet, is the club covered for liability?

Yes, cover is provided to affiliated clubs. Therefore in the event of a club organising a meet, any liability arising out of that activity is automatically covered. In the event of a non-member being held responsible for an accident causing injury or damage to Third Parties then in so far as any negligence attaching to the club arising out of the

organisation of the Event, cover would apply.

If any club or individual has any other query regarding the Associationis insurance cover please do not hesitate to contact me.

Please note that from this AGM in February 1997 Individual Membership will be available to Technical Officials who are not members of affiliated clubs, which will allow them to have the same insurance benefits available to Per Capita members currently.

Having recently returned to swimming coaching after a number of wilderness years, I was delighted at being appointed Manager for the Area 1 squad of this National scheme.

The most northerly of all Areas. Area 1 takes in Buckie in the east, Fort William in the west, Aviemore in the south and the Northern and Western Isles. Given the huge travel costs for the swimmers from the isles, it was not possible for these swimmers to be involved in the squad which was a major disappointment. Wherever the days took place some swimmers required to stay overnight adding to an already expensive hobby if you happen to live in Thurso or Lochaber.

It was of great interest to me working with coaches Richard Edwards (Inverness) and Keith Dunnett (Bridge of Don) and learning from the different approaches they brought to the poolside. We all enjoyed working with the well constructed guidelines but most rewarding of all was working with the young swimmers whose enthusiasm was shown by a 100% attendance rate and a rare willingness to learn and work hard. As the days progressed there was an ever increasing awareness that these swimmers were really coming together as a cohesive unit and this showed in the time trial results at the end of the programme.

Without doubt lessons have been learnt from this first year and some changes will doubtless be on the cards for 97, but our swimmers certainly found the days enjoyable and mightily worthwhile. The improvement achieved by many of these youngsters at Meets at the latter part of 1996 can no doubt in part be attributed to the confidence gained by being selected for this squad, and to the concentration on technique which was the main thrust of the programme.

One thing is certain - we have talented swimmers in this part of Scotland, and who knows where this particular Pathway may lead......?

This procedure No. 4 also now allows for candidates to be given ten (10) minutes in which to peruse the examination questions, prior to the official examination starting time.

ASA Winter Championships - NOW British Championships. Pre FINA List for Referees - to be extended to Starters next year. ASA "referee exam" NOT a "National Referee Exam". Published criteria for selection to National List and published criteria for selection to FINA List. Need to ensure recruitment of "younger" referees but no age limit at present. Move to select Pre FINA candidates under age 55 years. Identify "National" starters. Backstroke turn - still an issue with "continuous turning action". "Real issue is ASA Laws vs FINA Rules".

Main subject No. 2

Comparison between OMEGA and COLORADO system, printouts and idiosyncrasies shown, explained and compared. Copies distributed. Relay take-overs display/rulings.

ASA Law/FINA Rule - no negative reading permitted. COLORADO system is programmed **TO TAKE 0.15** secs OFF back-up times, based on assessment/experience that back-up is on average this amount slower. Need for courses of education in AOE. Attendance at such courses before taking exams to be strongly encouraged but must not be compulsory. The ASA Swimming Officials Committee now have objective of issuing such operating instructions.


National Convener Elizabeth Bowman was delighted with the progress achieved on the first get together and especially that Colette had agreed to take on the job after being contacted by Mary Black.
